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Sexual Education. A Challenge for the Romanian School

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ABSTRACT: The review emphasizes the balanced approach and the topicality of the information in the book "Sexual education. A challenge for the Romanian school" written by Cristina NeamÈ>u. The book explores the complexity and importance of sexuality education, addressing the challenges of adolescence and media impact, in a two-part structure.

The volume *Sexual education. A challenge for the Romanian school* was published in 2005 by the European Institute publishing house, being part of the Universitaria collection.

The present paper is structured in two parts. The first part addresses the issue of sexual education, and the second is centered on the presentation of human sexuality. The first part of the book contains 3 chapters and the second part contains 4 chapters. In total, the volume consists of 7 chapters that address every aspect related to human sexuality.

The paper *Sexual education. A challenge for the Romanian school* written by Cristina Neamţu in 2005 brings into discussion a particularly sensitive and important topic in the context of education: sex education in schools. The author aims to explore not only the theoretical and practical aspects of the implementation of this type of education, but also to analyze the challenges and its impact on students and the education system in Romania.

The volume begins by analyzing the role of the school in the sexual education process, highlighting the status, objectives and implementation methods of this discipline. The author points out that although sex education was not required by law at the time, there was an increased need to address this topic in schools, arguing that it should be an integral part of general education, overcoming the limitations of isolated leadership or biology classes.

The volume argues that the approach to sexuality education must be balanced and informatively open, to avoid stigmatization or misinformation. By providing accurate and accessible information, sexuality education can play a significant role in raising awareness and promoting a healthy attitude towards one's own sexual identity and that of others.

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Through the details presented in the second chapter, the book provides a detailed look at how sexuality education can serve as a catalyst for positive personal and social development during the sensitive period of adolescence, contributing to the understanding of physical changes and the psychological and social aspects surrounding identity young people's sexuality.

The fourth and fifth chapters bring to the fore sexual health and the importance of sexual education in promoting it. Explores the process of sexualization and the formation of sexual identity during adolescence. The author analyzes how sex education can positively influence the development of young people's sexual identity. In a period of intense physical and emotional changes, sexuality education becomes an indispensable tool in providing adolescents with a healthy framework to understand and accept sexual diversity.

By addressing topics such as contraception and the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, the book aims to provide solid knowledge that will contribute to the formation of a responsible attitude towards one's sexual health. Sexual education, the author claims, should not be limited to simple information, but to provide practical tools for adopting healthy and responsible behaviors in the field of sexuality.

The second part of the book is devoted to a detailed presentation of human sexuality. The author takes a scientific and objective perspective, giving readers an in-depth look at sexual diversity. By approaching this subject with scientific rigor, the book aims to demystify taboo aspects and provide accurate and up-to-date information on the variability and complexity of human sexuality.
